OUR MISSION STATEMENT

With God's support we are developing Portland as a dynamic, Spirit-led Church impacting on our town and beyond through encouragement, nurture and service e have been building forts and dens in our house lately. In one of the sofa ottomans we store all of the quilts my mother and my grandmother have made for us over the years. The quilts make great covers for dens and forts and we have plenty in our house. My mother made a baptismal quilt for each of the boys with biblical symbols stitched into the squares. She has also made several t-shirt quilts for Dave from all of the week-long residential camp t-shirts he acquired while doing youth ministry. But as we were bringing out ALL of the quilts, we ran across one that the boys had not seen before. This twelve blocks quilt is a bit older and each of the 12 blocks has a different design. Angus asked, "What is this?" Pointing to the snowman in the upper left-hand corner.



I went on to explain that the twelve blocks marked the

twelve months of the year. Each month depicts a scene that might be typical that particular month. For example, January, a snowman, February a heart, July has fireworks (this is an American quilt so the 4th of July is of note), etc.

I tried to explain that their great grandmother made this quilt 20 years ago not knowing who they were, but with the tremendous hope that one day, her grandchildren, my generation, would pass along a quilt to their children. Finlay, my six-year-old asked, "How did she know who we were?"

Without getting too scientific, too biological, or just too much, I answered, "Well, her love for me was so big, so hopeful, that one day, I could share it with you."

In our gospel lessons this summer, we have been working through the parables of Jesus in the gospel of Matthew. In Matthew we see Jesus speak about the sower, the weeds, the mustard seed, and feeding the 5,000. In the parable of the sower, Jesus says the Kin-dom of God is like and compare God's Kin-dom to a mustard seed, yeast, hidden treasure, and a net cast into the sea to fish.

What could we compare God's love to that might make it more understandable? With the simple explanation of why my grandmother made a quilt for them, I found myself explaining to my children God's love for them. Before they were born, they were loved.

God's love for us is that deep. Before we are able to articulate, before we are able to think and feel, God's love wraps us into God's fold. We then see God's love enacted throughout our lives in ways that catch us off guard.

If you had to finish this sentence, what would it look like: God's love is like

God's love is like a grandmother's love for her granddaughter that it might be shared with her children. God's love is like feeding those that are hungry so that everyone has enough. God's love is like looking out for what is best for the whole community rather than just ourselves.

This month, what does God's love look like to you?

Message from the Session Clerk

Dear members and friends of Portland

The easing of restrictions by the Scottish Government has allowed the possibility of Portland Church reopening its building for worship. We hope to reopen the church for Sunday worship soon, but we must be cautious in our approach following the best advice on offer from the Scottish Government and the Church of Scotland.

We can only reopen the church building for worship if we put the following measures in place to ensure that everyone can worship in as safe an environment as possible.

The worship service will last around 20 minutes. There can be no singing. Only the church sanctuary will be used. Entry will be by the front west door and a one-way system will be operated. Everyone must give their name and contact details (for Trace and Protect, if required). A maximum of 50 people are allowed in the building. People must sit at a marked pew space (families may sit together). Exit will be by the two front doors and the west side-door.

We must all follow the latest Scottish Government guidelines by:

Maintaining physical distancing advice (currently 2m). Washing or sanitising our hands on entering. Wearing a suitable face covering while in the building. Wiping down hard surfaces on entry and before we leave.

The church sanctuary will be cleaned before worship and all hymn books and bibles removed from the pews. Pew cushions will also have to be removed to allow the seats to be wiped clean. You can bring your own cushion and bible if you wish but they must be removed from the church as you leave. A collection box will be available for free-will envelopes and/or cash donations in the vestibule of the church (no collection during the service).

We will continue to provide an online worship service which can be accessed via Portland Church's website or via Facebook. You can also listen to the worship service by telephone.

We fully understand that returning to a worship service in the church building is a personal decision and we are all asked to be cautious and careful. We are all God's children and we will look after each other. Worship God in a place that you feel safe. We hope to be able to intimate a reopening date for Sunday worship soon.

Pray for our Interim Moderator, Bill Duncan and our Locum Minister, Rev Mary Elizabeth Prentice-Hyers. Pray for the isolated members of our community and help those you can.

From Columba to Covid

I have appreciated the singing during the online services broadcast, the church website and also on Facebook and YouTube. Times have changed but it is good to have been able to call on the anthems sung by Portland church and have these as part of the services and to hear the whole congregation singing the blessing at the end of each service. It has been good to share in Sunday church services on line and hear Mel's sermons. The worship team excelled on the 24th May. In his welcome John gave the background of the hymn *Take My Life* and we owe a debt of gratitude to those who have written the hymns we use in worship and those who sing them so beautifully.

In the first burst of clearing out, when I stupidly imagined I would actually do all the things I had been putting off for months and sometimes years, I found an article in a magazine and was fascinated to learn that probably the first recorded hymn sung in Scotland was Psalm 45, sung by St Columba on one of his evangelical journeys round Scotland. These are recorded in the biography written after his death. When Columba arrived at the fortress of the Pictish king, Bridei, he chose to sing this psalm, which seems an apt choice as it was written by the psalmist to another king. The story is more believable in that there was no miraculous conversion, but plenty of amplification. Columba's voice is recorded as thundering out and we do know that his persistence paid off ultimately in that he and his followers brought many to Christianity.

Communal singing is some way off at present as we move gradually towards reopening churches for worship. Meanwhile there have been some inventive ideas to let us continue to enjoy hymns and hymn singing.

Synchronising communal singing is not easy, but one tour de force was the Self Isolation choir singing the Messiah live, while thousands of members from all over the world sang at home. The Scottish Churches Disability Group researched the hymns available on YouTube and compiled a list of these which is available in the online Magazine, with a special link to those where the hymns have signing. <u>http://scdg.org.uk/</u>

A little man towards the back slowly raised his hand.


'Are you telling me you're perfect?' asked the preacher.

FIGHT AGAINST COVID-19 IN OUR COMMUNITY

The community and the team at ReJoin are so thankful to you and the Church of Scotland for the role you have taken in helping us to take part in a fight against COVID-19 here at Limphasa. May God bless you abundantly. Also, receive sincere appreciation from our Chief (Traditional Authority), our District Health Officer, Our moderator and the Open Market Chairperson.

ReJoin team, having received the funds, sat down in a meeting with the Church Session, the Traditional Authority, the District Health Officer and a few selected community representatives in order to inform them how the funds will be used and ask for their contributions.

The following core areas were chosen.

i. Buying enough materials to produce at least 2000 face masks within a period of 14 days with the available sewing machine at ReJoin

ii. Buying 30 tap buckets, 30 plastic basins and 30 plastic stools (complete hand wash sets)

By Tuesday last week everything was in place and the team at Re-Join started the donations with primary targets being the markets, community health centres, churches and youth organisations as planned. The donations were success (see the pictures and videos in the next email or emails). During the donations we also managed to give out to the women with babies a carton of clothes (sweaters) which was earlier on sent to Limphasa Church from Scotland and then forward to ReJoin.

Lastly, and on a sad note, I would like to inform you that the cases for COVID-19 are rising very fast in Malawi and including our district.

Bill, please don't forget us in case the other members whom you shared our initial concept paper with responds positively. I trust you Bill. Again, I am so thankful for the love that you and the entire Church of Scotland has towards Limphasa community.


