

Margaret **E** aster is not just a day. In the liturgical calendar of the church, Easter is a season. For fifty days after Easter, we are in a season of Eastertide. If we gathered together as a congregation, we would use the word *Alleluia* more and all of our music would be joyful. In worship, I would wear my white stole or scarf. We would begin with the words 'Christ is Risen – He is Risen Indeed!' We would celebrate that death has lost its sting and the world rejoices in new life.



With lockdown restrictions still in place, it is highly unlikely we will spend any of Eastertide together, but this does not mean we cannot mark this time differently.

How can we as a church, a body of people that know the promise of new life through the events of Easter, go back to the old normal?

It is my hope that the church, the community, the world, can reset the old normal. It is my hope that this time of lockdown opens our eyes to the needs of the vulnerable, opens our hearts to the need of community, for fellowship of other people, and opens our minds to the needs of the world.

After all that is also what resurrections looks like – new life.

# Tribute to Peter Livingstone

It was with great sorrow and sadness that we learned of the death of Peter Livingstone at the grand age of 97 years, on the Monday 6th April 2020 at Berelands Care Home.

Peter had a long and distinguished life as a Doctor and latterly as Consultant General Surgeon at Kilmarnock Hospital over many years. When he retired from his hospital commitments, Peter carried on with private consultancy work from his home Surgery until his mid-seventies. Over the years, he had a number of written contributions to the



medical journal, The Lancet. One significant presentation in 1958.

He was married to Kathleen (Bunty) and had 2 children, Morag and Cameron. Morag followed her father's steps and became a doctor and is still functioning as a General Practitioner in the South of England. Cameron is associated with Hotel Management in London. Sadly, Peter's wife passed away in January 2010.

Apart from medicine, when he could find the time, Peter's social life was spent with Bowling, Tennis and Golf. He was a member of the Royal and Ancient Golf Club in St Andrews, Royal Troon Golf Club and Prestwick Golf Club.

In the last 12 years at least, he liked nothing better than having lunch at Piersland Hotel on a Friday and at Prestwick Golf Club on a Wednesday and Saturday where he would meet his good friends.

Music was a major influence and joy in Peter's life. He was a committed Christian and had a particular liking for Organ Music and had a strong bass voice which he applied to several choirs over his lifetime, none more so than Portland Parish Church Choir in Troon. Peter gave a substantial donation for restoration of the of the organ at Portland Church and lived to enjoy the beautiful sound this organ each Sunday.

Peter was proud to be ordained as an Elder of Portland in 2000 - Peter lived a qualitative yet humble life where his gentle influence and infectious smile would have a tremendous influence on all who had the privilege of knowing him.

There will be no 'formal' funeral due to the present restrictive situation, however Peter will be cremated and in line with his wishes, his ashes will be taken to East Lothian and interred in the grave of his Mum and Dad at Gladsmuir Church of Scotland, Tranent.

We remember with thanksgiving and gratitude the loyal and unwavering service Peter gave to the Church and to our Lord and the inspiration that he has been for others. We commemorate the life and witness of Mr Peter Livingstone and to him we attribute the words found in the Gospel, "Well done, good and faithful servant – enter thou into the joy of your Lord". He was a remarkable person and we give thanks for his deep convictions and strong faith. We salute his memory. We entrust Peter into the loving hands of God and continue to hold his family and friends in our hearts and prayers. Many lives have been enhanced with the knowing of Peter Livingstone and we thank God for this and entrust him to His eternal care.

# **Tribute to William Harvey**

William Harvey was born on the 27th of March, 1921 in Kirkcolm and died peacefully 28th of March 2020 in Troon.

During World War II Billy faithfully served his country with the Royal Engineers in Italy. As one of the last remaining WWII veterans Billy laid the wreath at the Troon Cenotaph for the Centenary Armistice Service in 2018 impeccably dressed and wearing his military medals.

In the days after the war Billy worked as a driver for W B Anderson delivering fruit and veg in the Stranraer area. After his mother died Billy moved to Irvine to stay with his sister. While he was working as a school meals delivery driver Billy met Marion and his life took a marked turn in a blessed direction.



As time rolled on he drove for the Department of Social

Work and worked as a caretaker for the Troon Youth Centre. In retirement he enjoyed travel, gardening and social occasions with friends and family.

Billy was kind, thoughtful, and generous. He had a great sense of humour and, with a twinkle in his eye, he was always ready for a bit of fun. Jean Storer recounts that in the 1970s Billy helped provide transportation to a playgroup for children with disabilities that met in Portland Church Hall. The bus came to collect the children each day, and "Billie-the-bus" was the driver. Many people in Troon will remember Billy with great affection, and admiration for his cheerful help and commitment to others

Billy was interested in everyone and everything and more concerned for others than for himself. He was interested in people, he was interested in the World and he was interested in current affairs. He read the newspaper from cover to cover every day and had gently delivered opinions on many subjects.

Billy and Marion enjoyed many holidays, cruises and social times with friends and family over the years – he was a much loved uncle and brother in law.

Billy's life was lived with strength, compassion, hope and love.

As a church family we know his presence will be missed and keep Marion and family in our thoughts and prayers.

Marion would like to thank everyone for their kind messages of condolence, which were a great support and consolation.

t's daunting. It's overwhelming. It's all different. Our lives have been turned upside down in a matter of weeks. Psalm 46:1 "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble."



# Update on Malawi from Bill Weir

From earlier today (27/4), in an email I shared with John Reid, Bill Duncan and Mel.

Good morning everyone.

It's another beautiful morning and I hope you are all well and able to enjoy it. In the past week Catriona McKellar and I have been in on-line discussion to agree the available funding for our partner congregation at 31 December 2019. This amounted to a total of £2,000 being a mix of funding mainly from Sunday Coffees; the Stirling Bequest; our Harvest Appeal, and the harvest festival soup lunches. Accordingly a total of 1,670,000 MWK has been remitted to Rev Asayiwe Mwenitete who has today sent the following message:-

## Asayiwe Mwenitete: Morning Bill,

Grateful to inform you that we have collected the sent money today. The session executive, Prayer house chairpersons, guilds chairpersons and the finance and planning committee (an emergency kirk session) met last Saturday 25/04/20 and agreed to share MK400,000.00 to rejoin art project.

The remaining amount we agreed to electric materials and labour charge payment for electricity connection and cement for either sunday school hall plastering or building the pulpit. I will be updating you at every stage.

This was to minimize the number of session members due COVID-19 issue since not many people are allowed to meet and discuss issues.

God bless you and the Church in Scotland for your continued support.

Prior to remitting the money Asayiwe and I had been in discussion regarding the utilisation of these funds when we shared thoughts which may have been helpful in guiding their kirk session in allocating these precious funds wisely so that they are used for God's glory in the most appropriate manner. Having launched their Rejoin Art Project last year with financial support from both Ayr Presbytery and Portland I am glad that they are continuing to support it with an allocation of almost 25% of the funds. We may need to wait and see whether an element of these funds is ultimately used to build the pulpit, which I hope will turn out to be the case, but if not, the plastering of the Sunday School hall will also help to glorify God, and maybe our next funds transfer will complete the task.

This is the Easter gathering in Limphasa Church. Let me take this opportunity to share with you that the inside part of the Church is now fully plastered as you can see. May I also inform you that we are through with the plastering of the extended Limphasa Church except for the Sunday School hall which is not yet plastered. We also still have the church floor and the electric wiring remaining to be completed.

We thank God for giving us money to do the work. God bless.

## April 2020

It will be no surprise that the AGM planned for Thursday 30 April will not now take place and will have to be postponed till a later date.

The joint Easter services were also affected by the lockdown regulations and it was heartening to see the speedy response from the churches to ensure that people could worship in their congregations, not by physically coming together, but on line,

with various arrangements put in place for those without internet access.

Messy Church was the first TCT activity that had to be cancelled, followed by Eastertainment. A great deal of work had already gone into the planning of both events, which can be recycled for future occasions.

It has been agreed that in the light of the current uncertainty about schools reopening that the backpack and PE kit initiatives will be put on hold. Letters will not be sent out to the head teachers as has been done in previous years. Instead it has been suggested that congregations are urged where possible to support any local authority or other local enterprise who are trying to take care of the needs of children and parents. TCT would actively welcome any other suggestions on how we can help vulnerable families.
