It is with great joy that we get to baptize/christen two little girls this month. As the parents bring their children

forward, they are making a promise publicly of what God is always and already doing in their child's life. In baptism we are named and claimed as God's very own. The parents make promises, but as a congregation we make a promise too. The question is this:

Do you, as members of the church of Jesus Christ Promise to guide and nurture not just (the child of the day), But every child that comes through these doors By word and deed, with love and prayer Encouraging them to know and follow Christ?

It is my hope that we can all say a resounding, 'Yes!' We make a promise that, as a church, the sanctuary and our community is a place they, and everyone, feel welcome.

You all may have noticed we have a 'pray ground' or a 'wiggle room,' (name still to be determined) up at the front of the sanctuary. Since Harvest Sunday we have had the opportunity to welcome the children back into our midst. And since we all know that children have the wiggles (so do adults for that matter), we have created a space for the children to stay busy but remain in the wider community's presence. It is amazing what children can pick up from just being around things. For instance, Finlay is now interested in learning the Lord's Prayer and Angus has discovered a new way of praying using the hand poppers. Parents have commented to me that they feel more relaxed coming to church knowing that their children can have a space to wiggle.

I recently met a family to discuss a baptism. We met in the sanctuary to let the children get familiar with the space. The older brother said, 'What's that?' pointing to the pulpit. I invited him up to the font, to the communion table, and even the pulpit, to look and see. He was fascinated. He asked what each place was for and in these moments I got to share about the sacraments of the church. Who knows if it stuck? But the fact that he was curious gave me hope.

I hope this month we can welcome even more children into our midst, living and fulfilling our promise that we make at each baptism, *by word and deed, with love and prayer, encouraging* children to know and follow the one whom already loves them.



We are grateful for the invaluable contribution he has made over the years, including masterminding the publicity for joint services.

Messy Church / Wintertainment

Details of 'virtual' Messy Church events during lockdown had been circulated. A Messy Church has been planned in St Meddans for Sunday 21 November, with 5 craft tables. The \pounds 500, agreed at our last meeting for Messy Church activities, was confirmed. At present, there are two other events planned in the New Year. All Messy Church literature has the TCT branding clearly visible. Some of the present craft team cannot take part at present and it is hoped that more parents can be recruited to help.

Joint Christmas Services and distribution of literature.

A joint service would be difficult due to the possible numbers attending and Covid restrictions. A'virtual' joint service was discussed. It was agreed that the ministers and church leaders should meet to discuss details. A leaflet would be produced and delivered with Troon's Going Out.

Micah Project

Helen Hogg gave an update on progress, outlining how it works with TEAM AROUND which has input from schools, social workers, and churches. There has been a high level of need in the town over the last two years.

Job Club at Seagate and Christians against Poverty

David Shaw of Seagate is willing to come to any church or organisation to speak about their Life Skills initiative, a seven week course where Christians and non-Christians come together to assist people to live on a low income. It is built around a prayer, soup and sandwich, and a prayer. Items include managing bills, getting good cheap food by shopping at the right times and fixing fire alarms and detectors. The talk lasts about 10 minutes. After the course people keep in touch and make sure those who have taken part know that somebody cares. Contact artieshaw49@gmail.com

MALAWI PARTNERSHIP REPORT

Over recent months our partner congregation in Limphasa has celebrated the completion of the works to furnish their church building with a newly constructed Communion Table, three beautifully crafted chairs, a Lectern and a fine wooden Pulpit. These complement and grace the much enlarged building and it is most satisfying to see how our financial contributions towards the funding of these works have been put to use in such a pleasing way.

In thanking Portland Church for all of our financial assistance towards the total rebuilding of their church over the past four years the Rev Asayiwe Mwenitete has shared some photographs which help to illustrate this wonderful achievement and which show the inside and outside of the building.

As this has not been our one and only mission outreach to Malawi since our partnership commenced in 2012 I have prepared a summary of the background to our involvement together with a listing of some of the other significant projects we have supported in that time in fulfilment of its objectives. It is without doubt an impressive achievement by the members of Portland Church in following Christ's command to: '*Go and preach the good news to everyone in the world*'.

Our Malawi Mission – Fulfilling a Promise

Portland Church is twinned with Limphasa Congregation in rural northern Malawi. It lies between the lake shore district of Nkhata Bay and the City of Mzuzu and consists of the Main Church building within the Mpamba Community and eleven remote Prayer House congregations.

The Partnership was originally agreed between Rev Alick Mhone and Rev Jamie Milliken with the formal Twinning Agreement being signed in 2012. Since 2018 Limphasa Church has been led by Rev Asayiwe Mwenitete.

The origins of the Partnership were in 2004 when a World Mission team, including a minister from the Presbytery of Ayr, had visited Malawi just after a very poor harvest. The story of the traumatic experience of witnessing many people facing starvation led to a Presbytery of Ayr team visit in 2006 to determine how best to help. This resulted in a Covenant of Partnership between the Presbytery of Ayr and Bandawe and Limphasa Presbyteries of the CCAP which encouraged individual churches in the Presbytery of Ayr to twin with individual churches in the two Partner Presbyteries. Five subsequent team visits have taken place in support of this with the most recent being in 2017 when a senior elder from Portland Church was part of the visiting team to Malawi from Ayr Presbytery. These visits have greatly helped to sustain, develop and strengthen these links and to manage the specific projects that are supported. On quite a number of occasions Ayr Presbytery has also welcomed our Brothers and Sisters in Christ from Malawi as their guests and in 2015 Portland's Partnership with Limphasa Church was greatly strengthened as a result of such a visit to Portland by their minister.

The Partnership Agreement states:

We agree to work together in a twinning partnership to understand and support each other in our faith and works.

Our purpose is to: Build a positive partnership in which we can understand each other's culture

Share our resources and knowledge with each other in appropriate ways

Assist in enriching the lives of our partners however possible

In the years since entering into this agreement in 2012 Portland Church has worked consistently to fulfil these objectives while also actively supporting initiatives by Ayr Presbytery such as their Alternative Gift Schemes to provide the twelve partnership churches with mosquito nets; solar lamps; and with seeds and fertiliser.

Some of the key achievements in this time have been the following:

Helping to fund reconstruction of a severely flood damaged prayer house

Funding supplies of maize to supplement flood damaged crops

Providing solar lamps to aid opportunities for study by students

Securing funding for a youth engagement and marketable skills project

Being a major source of funding for the reconstruction of Limphasa Church following its condemnation as being unsafe due to termite destruction. This has resulted in a substantially enlarged building now with electric lighting, and with its internal walls rendered, and with a smooth concrete floor.

Helping with the funding of a newly crafted Communion Table together with three chairs and a fine new wooden pulpit.

Arranging for the delivery of donated goods including sewing machines and a large number of beautifully knitted baby hats and new born clothing Helping to fund various Covid prevention measures including youth programmes to manufacture

Helping to fund various Covid prevention measures including youth programmes to manufacture 10,000 face masks and with the provision of hand washing stations and the dissemination of health advice within the community including the translation of information into the native language

Supporting the welfare of the minister and the education of his family

Providing a second-hand motor cycle to enable the minister to travel to outlying communities and distant prayer houses much more readily. Until then visits were made on foot with some involving a three hour journey

Assistance and supplies have also been provided to Ekwendeni Mission Hospital

We are most grateful for all of the support so generously given by our members and also by others in our community in reaching out to our friends in Malawi. We have been blessed to be in a position to provide help. This is not just financial help. It also means maintaining a relationship with communities and individuals in far off Malawi and letting them know that we care.
