

#### Hymn 502 (Updated version Sung at Portland service on 30.1.22)

Take my life and let it be Consecrated, Lord, to Thee. Take my moments and my days, Let them flow in endless praise.

Take my hands and let them move At the impulse of Thy love. Take my feet and let them be Swift and beautiful for Thee.

Take my voice and let me sing, Always, only for my King. Take my lips and let them be Filled with messages from Thee. Take my silver and my gold, Not a mite would I withhold. Take my intellect and use Every pow'r as Thou shalt choose.

Take my will and make it Thine, It shall be no longer mine. Take my heart, it is Thine own, It shall be Thy royal throne.

Take my love, my Lord, I pour At Thy feet its treasure store. Take myself and I will be Ever, only, all for Thee.

Frances Ridley Havergal (1836-1879)

**Frances Ridley Havergal** was an English religious poet and hymn writer. She also wrote hymn melodies, religious tracts, and works for children. One of the most dedicated Christian women of the nineteenth century, Frances was the youngest child of a Church of England minister.

Though she was always in frail health, she led an active life, encouraging many people to turn to Jesus and others to seek a deeper spiritual walk. Frances had begun reading and memorising the Bible at the age of four (eventually memorising The Psalms, Isaiah and most of the New Testament). At seven she wrote her first poems. Several of her mature verses became hymns. In addition to "Take My Life," she wrote such favourites as "I Gave My Life for Thee," "Like a River Glorious," and "Who Is on the Lord's Side?"

Because her voice was lovely, Frances was in demand as a concert soloist. She was also a brilliant pianist and learned several modern languages as well as Greek and Hebrew. With all her education, however, Frances Havergal maintained a simple faith and confidence in her Lord. She never wrote a line of poetry without praying over it.


One of the lines of Frances Havergal's hymn says, "Take my silver and my gold; not a mite would I withhold." In 1878, four years after writing the hymn, Miss Havergal wrote a friend, The Lord has shown me another little step, and, of course, I have taken it with extreme delight. 'Take my silver and my gold' now means shipping off all my ornaments to the Church Missionary House, including a jewel cabinet that is really fit for a countess, where all will be accepted and disposed of for me...Nearly fifty articles are being packed up. I don't think I ever packed a box with such pleasure." (Interestingly this verse is no longer included in CH4.)





# SERVICES ON THE WEBSITE

# Malawi Update

Recent messages from our partner congregation at Limphasa in northern Malawi have shared reports on the weather situation. With Limphasa being a rural community in which the cultivation of subsistence crops features strongly, the news that they had not received rains was a matter of considerable concern to everyone. Fortunately a subsequent message brought the joyous update that they had received good rains two days previously and that they had started cultivating the lands.

Here in Scotland rainy days are rarely associated with joy so it is quite enlightening to hear just how precious the right type of rain is and to appreciate it as a gift from God. Too much rain brings about the destruction of buildings and crops, as was the case six or seven years ago when a prayerhouse was all but destroyed. With help from our congregation it was rebuilt and has stood the test of time in the years since then.


Substantial parts of Malawi have been experiencing drought conditions of late which will badly affect the next harvest of staple crops such as maize and rice. Already the price of a sack of rice has risen more than 60% and there is a very real prospect of food shortages being widespread and food being unaffordable. The occasional empty shelf in our supermarkets is a minor inconvenience in comparison, and we never go hungry. ## **MAILING LIST**


