## **Micah Project - ways to help**

t was a long time coming, first booked in 2018, obviously cancelled in 2020 but this year I was in **Oberammergau** to see The Passion Play and it was well worth the wait, so I thought I would share some of its background and my experience.

During the 30 years war from 1618-1648, Europe was ravaged by destruction, famine, and plague. For quite some time Oberammergau managed to keep the plague at bay with strictly enforced quarantine (sound familiar), but one night an inhabitant of Oberammergau who had been working away from home, evaded the guards returned to visit his family and brought the plague to the village resulting in 84 deaths. The people believed that this was the hand of God and sent as a punishment and looked for some form of penitence. They made a solemn vow to perform every tenth year a play of the Saviour's suffering and death if God would deliver them from the disease. First performed in 1634, repeated every 10 years until 1674 when the date was changed to the start of the decade. Only twice has the play not taken place, in 1770 when passion plays were banned and 1940 due to the Second World War. Such is the ongoing determination to honour the original Vow.

Over the years the format and script has changed with its roots in the medieval mystery play, moving towards the story of Christ's Passion. It has also moved on from the one time emphasis on the Devil as the inspirer and instigator of the treatment of Jesus. In 1770 the Bavarian government banned all passion plays due to criticism that it had moved away too far from the New Testament narrative. Persistent protests paid off and the Play was reinstated in 1780 with revised texts. Gradual change only sanctioned by the Oberammergau Passion Play organising body is ongoing to this day. The director, Christian Stuckl says "If the Play is to survive, it must evolve".

My overwhelming memory is the vastness and quality of the production, staging, acting, choir and music which is outstanding. As well as the main roles of Jesus, Mary, Peter, Judas, Pontius Pilate and Caiaphas there will be 120 major and minor speaking roles – in the Palm Sunday scheme there can be as many as 500 people on stage. In other scenes there were goats, doves, sheep, horses and even camels and of course a donkey.

All in Oberammergau are committed to taking part – a person must have been born in the village or have lived there for 20 years, but if someone from outside marries into it, then that period is reduced by half. During the second world war there was an influx of refugees from Eastern Europe who were assimilated and became eligible to take part in 1970. The cast is made up of Catholics, Protestants, some with no church affiliation and in 2000 some actors came from Muslims – for the 2022 production the Second Director of the Play is a Muslim. And of course, the various restrictions on women taking part due to age and marital status have been done away with. But prior to that it was not unknown for women to put off marriage for many years in the hope of playing Mary or Mary Magdalene. Men (other than the clean-shaven Roman soldiers) must grow their beards and hair because traditionally on Ash Wednesday the year before the play, the 'Hair Decree' comes into operation. Good business for the barbers when immediately after the final performance a large number of men want their beards shaved off and hair cut. Recently the hair has been saved and is used in various art forms (see photos).

Profits from the Play are ploughed back into the community and those taking part including the children are remunerated. It is a huge commitment to those who take part, taking up a large proportion of their lives over the time of preparation and staging.

The audiences are as vast as the production and come from all round the world to have this experience – representing many faiths. For the people of Oberammergau, the Play has never just been about theatre, it has been an expression of communal faith, an act of worship, a mission undertaken by the village in response to the Vow, and a mission on behalf of the world-wide community. Long may it continue.

#### Support for Ukraine - Ayrshire Scotland Aid for Ukraine Refugees

There is a unit in Ayr where Ukrainian Refugees arriving in Scotland can make a private appointment to browse with dignity and respect, they can select anything that they need, like clothing, shoes, stationery, baby items, toiletries and much more for free.

The unit was opened by two ladies Rachel and Anne who met whilst sorting donations to go to the Ukraine. Anne and Rachel took items that were unsuitable or missed the shipment and bartered them for toiletries which they then donated to a shop in Ayr which in turn transported all donations to Poland.

Anne and Rachel had a concern about what help, and assistance, was being offered to incoming Refugees and made a plea for donations after a local businessman offered free storage. Although based in Ayr they found that the main source of donations came from Troon.

They have set up the unit like a shop with departments for women, children, babies, and men. The unit is full to bursting with donated items and they would like to publicise its existence so that Ukrainian Refugees can book an appointment to browse.

Recently, they were pleased to assist a Ukrainian student living in Paisley to gain items for her home as she is welcoming a fellow Ukrainian who is arriving shortly to stay. They were also humbled to assist a family of six who arrived in Prestwick with just hand luggage after being given only an hour to gather their belongings and flee their beloved homeland.

We have also the very valued assistance of our own Morag Hamil who has been taking in donations, sorting them, and washing clothes and shoes to make them more presentable. It is very humbling to note that of the many items donated many are new and bought for the purpose of donating. Anne and Rachel would also like to thank the people and businesses of Ayrshire, Paisley and in particular Troon for all their generous donations and support.

The group is called Ayrshire Scotland Aid for Ukraine Refugees and Anne and Rachel can be contacted through the Facebook group, via messenger or email. <u>asafurfree@gmail.com</u>.

The Facebook group will also be used to call out for items needed or are running short of, as well as updates on what is going on, so please feel free to join and encourage others.

Presently, we are also asking for medication or any medical items that can be used in a hospital to be sent to Ukraine.

Donations can be handed directly to Morag or left in Portland Church (clearly labelled please).
