Dear Friends,

It seems no time at all since we were in Advent last year! As we spend the next four weeks preparing for the birth of Christ it will be wonderful to see as many of you are as able to join for our services. It will be particularly good to share in worship with all three congregations of Troon: Old, Portland and St Meddans as the future Troon Church of Scotland for many of our Advent services, particularly our Pop-Up Nativity and the evening services based around the themes of Peace, Hope, Joy and Love. The candles in our Advent wreath are all based upon this theme, with the central candle, of course, representing the light of Christ who came into the world to be amongst ordinary people.

This year we are also singing hymn 685, For Everyone Born, A Place at the Table as our Advent hymn. This hymn is the work of Shirley Erena Murray (b.1931 in Aotearoa, New Zealand) whose various hymns appears in hymn books all over the world. The themes of her hymns range from social justice, peace, human rights, and the voice of women, to the sacraments, the Church year, and eco-theology. This hymn is about the radical inclusiveness of the church and identifying some of the divides in both church and society, affirms that all

have 'a place at the table'. For me, it personifies the teaching and work of Jesus in our world: our responsibility as Christians and people of faith is to not only follow the teaching, but to act on it.

I came across this prayer by David Adams recently, and felt that it really captured the wonder of the coming season, with a gentle reminder that Jesus is not just for Christmas...

Statement for the congregations on the Union

It is a huge logistical challenge to bring three congregations, Kirk Sessions (trustees), congregational rolls, accounts, pastoral care, ministries and mission all together into one.

> For there is hope for a tree, if it is cut down, that it will sprout again, and that its shoots will not cease. (Job 14:7)

With challenge comes opportunity. Uniting to form one Troon Church of Scotland gives opportunity to worship together and pool resources for effective mission. Together is stronger.

Our first challenge was successfully accomplished choosing a name for the new church – Troon Church of Scotland.

Our next challenge is setting out the details of our Union in a legal framework to satisfy Church Law. This is called the Basis of Union. This is a lengthy document and must be agreed by all Kirk Sessions and congregations forming the union.

This document will be available to view on our website, and paper copies will be available on request, once it has been approved by the Presbytery of the South West, the Church of Scotland's Law Department, Principal Clerk, and Presbytery Planning Department.

A date for the congregations to vote will be arranged early in the new year.

We move forward in faith.


Building Bridges

Far from the gondolas and palaces of the Grand Canal in Venice there is industrial and dockyard ground. It was raining and we were geocaching, an activity which often leads you to unusual places. In this dreich wasteland we came across a structure, a huge sculpture of hands joined across a canal.



The joined hands were symbolic of five aspects of unity. As the noise of war roared from the Middle East these joined hands seemed to offer a ray of light.

The first symbolised FRIENDSHIP, the second FAITH, the third HELP, the fourth LOVE. The last set of clasped hands symbolised HOPE. Their size and towering set of clasped hands offered a powerful scene against the grey sky.

Arran Church Closures

This is the village of Lamlash on Arran. The autumn colours were vibrant; the left side of the photo shows Lamlash Church. It has just closed. Three other churches on Arran have also held their



final service. There is not a single Church of Scotland minister on Arran at the moment, nor has there been for at least a year. There has of course, been much weeping and wailing and gnashing of teeth, but to no avail. The most pain is centred around the loss of their halls, well used and busy all week. In Lamlash there is a proposal to hold a community buy-out of the hall, so that the villagers have continued use of it.

Funerals, weddings or baptisms have been conducted by Readers, Celebrants or a retired minister. Of course the numbers attending church services have gone down and the islanders know this. The churches they built and maintained, which have witnessed many significant events in their lives have gone forever. It's not just a case of crossing the road to another church, as here in Troon, but a journey to another village.

The Church of Scotland's rationale for the closure of so many churches is financial. Their aim is to underpin and promote a leaner and fitter organisation. Can this be achieved? Is this the best way? Or will it be counter productive?

EXPLORE A NEW SPACE

The new Faith Museum in County Durham has just opened, housed in a 14th-century wing of Auckland Castle. Inside the sleek building by Niall MeLaughlin Architects lie some 250 precious objects.



Each reveals a story of faith in Britain over 6,000 years, from the Neolithic period to 2000. Ten years in the making, the museum will also stage exhibitions exploring timeless ideas. Among the pieces now on display is this, the exquisite Painswick Astrolabe, c.1370, surely a status symbol of its time.
