OUR MISSION STATEMENT

Dear friends,

The summer months are finally with us, and it feels good to be out and about in the sunshine which has been blessing Troon. Our beach is a popular draw for tourists each year, and the town feels different when there are more people here! Our church family has celebrated many things in the last couple of months. We've shared with the BB all their



successes as they've marked the end of a year, and we have given thanks for our community through various coffee mornings, shared lunches with St Meddans, Christian Aid week, Garden Day and a service to celebrate the young people of our congregation. As we can, perhaps, take a rest over the coming months, it will be good to see all of our organisations start up again, and I'm sure there will be some significant planning for various activities during the summer break.

Sometimes it is when we have some time on our hands that we are able to reconnect with God and assess what it is we are doing. Our book group during June has been reading 'Walking the Edges: Living in the Presence of God', by David Adam, a former priest who lived and worked in Lindisfarne. The book is about the lives and faith practices of some familiar saints, how their faith and wisdom can make meaning for our time. Adam writes:

'We must learn to walk the edges of our experience if we are to journey into God. As we are living and moving beings we cannot stand still for long: we will either reach forward and grow, or stultify and start losing what we have had. This applies to individuals and their talents as well as to communities and churches. To live life to the full we have to reach out to the beyond, we have to seek to extend ourselves.'

Adam's words were written in 2003, but they are just as pertinent now. As the three churches of Troon unite as *Troon Parish Church* at some point in the hopefully not-too-distant future, I am sure that the people of the joint congregation will be turning their thoughts and perspectives outwards, to see what else can be achieved in Troon. Adam introduced many of the book group to the concept of a 'Caim' from the tradition of St Ninian who of course lived at Whithorn, in the *Candida Casa*. A suggestion from David Adam for practising the Caim:

"Visualise yourself encircled by the love, the light, the peace of God. Make a circle by using the index finger of your right hand, extending your arm and slowly turning clockwise until you have made a circle in which you are enclosed. Then say:

Circle me, O God, Keep peace within Trouble without.

Circle me, O God, Keep love within Hatred out.

Circle me, O God, Keep light within, And darkness out.

Learn to trust in that love, that light, that peace. Know that God is with you, before you and behind you. God will protect you from your past and in the future. Let his presence give you light, love and peace.

Then, radiate the love and light and peace. Visualize other people surrounded by God and immersed in his presence. The people you pray for, see them surrounded by light, by the love of God, by his peace and know that this is a reality if we only have eyes to see.

See the light, love and peace that God gives to you rippling out in waves in the way a stone makes waves when it is thrown into a pond. Reach out in prayer to others. Pray that they may know the reality that God is life and joy and peace."

It is my hope that we can all share, as David Adam does, in the knowledge that God is life and joy and peace.


ORGAN RECITAL

Fair Pay for Social Care

The Church of Scotland has initiated a campaign for Fair Pay for Social Care. This is supported by CrossReach and Justice and Peace Scotland. The campaign aims to raise awareness of the need to pay care workers more fairly and to put pressure on the Scottish Government on this issue. The campaign's organisers are asking faith leaders and those who hold a position of responsibility in their church, to sign a declaration initiated by the Moderator of the Church of Scotland and the Archbishop of Glasgow. This will show that there is good support for the campaign.

The declaration calls on the Scottish Government to do everything within its power to ensure all frontline social care workers are paid a minimum of £12 per hour immediately, and for funding to allow all social care staff to be recognised for their skills, experience and contributions, in whichever role they serve. Faith leaders and all those who lead congregation-based services and activities which support vulnerable people are invited to sign the <u>declaration</u> on the CrossReach website. If this is you please sign up as the more signatures we gather the louder our voices will be when we meet MSPs to discuss this issue.
