FORMING A CHURCH UNION – UPDATE

Choosing a new church name

Representatives from all three Churches of Scotland in Troon and our Interim Moderators have met monthly since January 2023.

In April 2023, the Presbytery of the South West sent two facilitators to join the group to guide us through the legal documentation called a "Basis of Union".

The procedure was explained.

Where a union of congregations is specified by the Presbytery Plan the following steps must be taken to progress to union: -

1. A draft Basis of Union is prepared by the Kirk Sessions of the uniting congregations and Presbytery.

2. Presbytery send a copy of the draft Basis of Union to:

- The law department.
- Presbytery Planning.
- The Principal Clerk.

3. If necessary, the Basis of Union should be modified to incorporate any changes suggested by the law department and the Principal Clerk.

4. The Basis of Union must be approved by:

- The uniting Kirk Sessions.
- The uniting congregations (by way of a congregational vote).
- Presbytery.

A union of congregations will result in a name change for the newly united congregation.

In 2008 the General Assembly passed a deliverance instructing Presbyteries and congregations to comply with a scheme devised by the Legal Questions Committee for the naming of congregations to ensure compliance with the rules set out in the 2005 Act. The name must include: -

• A geographical reference (city/town/village).

• An additional name to identify the congregation within that location (only essential if there is more than one Church of Scotland in the city/town/village).

• The words "Church of Scotland".

The new name for the united congregation is required for the Basis of Union document.

It is, therefore, vitally important that this new name is found as soon as possible.

The congregations will be involved in choosing this new name.

You are invited to suggest an appropriate church name and place it in the "suggestions box" (found in the church vestibule). If you are unable to do this, (or get someone to do this on your behalf), please send your suggestion by email to <u>office@troonportlandchurch.org.uk</u>.

We will accept suggestions until and including Sunday the 14th of May. On the next Sunday, the 21st of May, we will collectively (all three congregations) vote for a new church name from a list of most popular suggestions.

ZAMBIAN VISIT

When I arrived in Zambia at the beginning of February, it was the end of the Rainy Season, but there was still to be an amount of rain to fall. We were to catch the tail end of tropical storm "Freddie" which was to cause such devastation in Malawi. The continuing rain was welcomed though in Zambia as the water table was finally rising after a period of prolonged drought. Lake Kariba was filling up and the turbines at the mighty Kariba dam would produce electricity again. No more outages; industry could have a more reliable supply; the copper mines in the north could go into full production again and earn much needed foreign currency; homes could hope for a more reliable service.

After a gap of roughly four years I noticed how Lusaka had grown. So many new shopping malls, shiny hotels and restaurants, financial buildings and big wide roads with flyovers, built of course by China. This inevitably brought increased traffic which could and did lead to incidents of gridlock.

The family now live about forty minutes out of the city and the final part of the journey is on the familiar reddish brown dirt road flanked on one side by fast growing maize and on the other by field after field of varying crops. The rains were working their magic.

A highlight of my holiday was to revisit the town of Livingstone with a three night stay in a hotel on the banks of the mighty Zambezi river just above the Victoria Falls. Livingstone is the only town in Zambia to have retained its colonial name out of respect for David Livingstone who is still held in very high regard.

The Victoria Falls or Mosi-oa-Tunya meaning, The Smoke that Thunders, are the most amazing sight. They are a mile wide and a sheer precipice drop of 335 feet, which produces the largest curtain of falling water in the world .The spray produced by this water crashing into the gorge below can rise so high that from a distance it really does look like smoke rising out of the surrounding flat land. I wasn't able to climb down the steep and slippery path this visit but had the wonderfully exciting experience of flying over the Falls in a helicopter and then flying down into the Gorges just a few feet above the water which was in full spate. Very exhilarating if somewhat scary. Back in Lusaka it was lovely to attend worship again in St Columba's Presbyterian Church. It is an early start on a Sunday morning. The first service is at 8 am. Remember it is a 40 minute drive into town and my son Douglas was the duty elder on the final Sunday, which meant we also stayed on for the 2nd service as the duty elder takes an active part in both services. The first service is very similar to our Church of Scotland service, while the later has evolved into a more African form with more singing and participation.

Perhaps in reality it was a long morning but I didn't find it so. It was wonderful to be part of such a joyous occasion. Between services Doug and I shared coffee with the Reverend Chaka Habasila whom I had already met socially .He was most interested in and concerned about our situation here in Troon and asked me to pass on his sincere good wishes to everyone in the congregation for the future. It is very special to know that while we move forward to form a combined Troon Church of Scotland there is yet another Church in Africa praying for our future.
