

Dear friends,

It is quite amazing how quickly our year moves on. It seems no time at all that we were all preparing for Christmas and to celebrate the birth of Christ. When you read this, we will have celebrated Candlemas which marks the feast of the presentation of Jesus at the temple which happens on



the 2 nd of February each year, 40 days after we mark Jesus' birth. It also marks the time when our year turns to look towards the 40 days preparation of Lent which of course starts on Ash Wednesday.

As a child I was always perplexed by the close proximity of Christmas to Lent, and we can of course, relate this current position in our year to the synod which happened in Whitby Abbey, 664 CE, overseen by the Abess Hild. Until this point, two major branches of Christianity celebrated Easter at different times during the year according to their calendars. In the end, the Roman date was adopted by the Celtic Christians, and we retain this legacy.

Now known as St Hild, the abbesses' fame was secured locally with the snakestones legend, which dates back to the Middle Ages. The legend holds that Whitby and the surrounding area was plagued by snakes. Locals sought the help of St Hild, and she in turn prayed to God. First she prayed to remove the snakes' heads, and then she prayed to turn their bodies to stone. In one account of the legend St Hild invokes the Gospel of St Mark 11:23, and utters Christ's words, 'Be removed and cast into the sea.'

Headless snakes can still be found today on Whitby's shoreline. But we now know that these enigmatic objects are in fact ammonite fossils. The fossils date from the Jurassic Period, and enterprising Victorians used to carve snakes' heads into them to sell to tourists.

In the wondrous twisting of folk-lore, fable and religion, we see the passing on of knowledge, faith and meaning. Of course, St Hild is not the only Celtic Saint to have been credited with the removal of snakes: St Patrick is rather more famous for his legend of snake removal from Ireland. In another legend shared this time by the Venerable Bede, St Hild's mother had a vision of Hild as a light: Bede indeed saw that Hild's involvement in the spread of Christianity and her part in helping to settle the timing of Easter showed her to be a light in the world, active in the passing of the light of Christ across the whole of Britain.

As we celebrate the light of Christ this year at Candlemas, we are all encouraged to take the light of Jesus into our worlds, and to shine this light into places of darkness. I pray that you all feel that light in your life and are able, in your own way, to spread the light of Christ in your own part of our country in beautiful Troon.

A message from the Session Clerk

I hope it's not too late to wish everyone a very Happy New Year. This year, 2024, will see major changes to the Church of Scotland in Troon. As you will be aware, the three Churches of Scotland in Troon will form a union to become one. Our new name will be Troon Church of Scotland. To comply with Church Law, we have been working to complete a document called the Basis of Union that outlines the principles and agreements that unite two or more congregations within the Church of Scotland.

The draft Basis of Union is prepared by the Kirk Sessions of the uniting congregations and Presbytery. This draft Basis of Union has now been approved by all three Kirk Sessions, Presbytery, the Principal Clerk and the Law Department of the Church of Scotland. It now has to be approved by the congregations before the union can officially happen.

Presbytery will set a date for a congregational meeting, and we should be able to inform you of an exact date very soon. You will be asked to accept (or reject) the Basis of Union by casting your vote in person during this congregational meeting. The votes are counted by Presbytery and the result announced. Assuming the vote is in favour, then we can proceed to union.

The Basis of Union can be found on the Troon Church of Scotland and Portland's websites, and I would encourage you to read it when you get a chance. We will also send out paper copies of the Basis of Union to each member household in Troon and offer question and answer sessions (dates and times to be confirmed).

Page 1 of the Basis of Union sets out the principles and agreements with the remaining pages expanding these with greater detail.

Extract from Page 1 of the Basis of Union:

The congregation of Troon Old Parish Church of Scotland (SC007246) and the congregation of Portland Parish Church of Scotland: Troon (SC003477) and the congregation of Troon St Meddan's Parish Church of Scotland (SC015019) shall be united on a date to be determined by Presbytery, and that on the following terms and conditions:

- **1. Name:** The name of the united charge shall be Troon Church of Scotland and SC015019 will be retained.
- 4. Places of Worship: Both churches at present used and occupied by the congregations of Troon Portland and Troon St Meddan's will be the places of worship of the united charge. The church sanctuary at present used by the congregation of Troon Old shall be used, sold, let or otherwise disposed of subject to the titles on which it is held, subject to the approval of the Presbytery and, if necessary, the General Trustees or the General Assembly. The free proceeds of any such sale or let shall: (a) if falling within the scope of Act VII 1995, be credited to the benefit of the congregation in the Consolidated Fabric Fund; or (b) if not falling within the scope of the said Act, be held and applied for fabric purposes in connection with the properties of the congregation. The church located in the area of North East Troon in the parish of Troon shall be a Local Mission Church.
- **8.** Ministry: The ministry arrangements will be as laid out in the Basis of Team Ministry. All the charges coming into the union are currently vacant. The charge will be reviewable after five years.

I would encourage you to read the whole document and ask questions. You should be made aware that we cannot start proceedings to call a Minister until the union has officially been completed.

As a new Troon Church of Scotland, we have been allocated two full time equivalent posts of Word and Sacrament (Ministers) along with an O.L.M (Ordinated Local Minister) and a locally funded Children-Youth-Family Worker, all forming a Team Ministry.

I am happy to try and answer any questions either in person after worship on a Sunday and/or at the question-and-answer meeting (dates still to be arranged) or by email if that is more convenient.

We continue to move forward in faith.

Keep the church in your prayers.
